### Established in 2015, the Centre for Stories:

- Collects, collates and disseminates the stories of people from marginalised groups and diverse backgrounds.
- Fosters emerging writers with culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and other minority groups.
- Offers internships to foster diversity in arts administration.
- Develops relationships with artists linked to the Indian Ocean; current relationships include Indonesia, Singapore, and India.
- Hosts and produces events to showcase emerging artists.
- Partners with government and non-government agencies to expand creative industries to include other voices within Western Australia, Australia, and the region.
- Contributes to the Government's policy directions in Cultural Industries, Cultural Diversity and Multiculturalism and Engagement within the Indian Ocean Rim.
- Enhances cultural diversity, cultural industries, and community engagement.
- Empowers multiple voices to shape broader narratives about art, culture, and Western Australian history.
- Realises the City of Perth strategic initiatives for 2030.

## Fostering the Next Generation of Creatives



The Centre for Stories has mentored 35 emerging writers over four years.

### Oral Stories

The Centre for Stories has trained over 80 people in the craft of oral storytelling over four years.

#### Outcomes:

- Stories shared on the Centre for Stories" podcast and published on the website.
- Stories shared at live events at the Centre and externally at various venues.
- Stories Staged Three stories presented on stage at two sold-out shows at The Blue Room Theatre Winter Arts Program in 2018.
- Saga Sisterhood a project with South Asian Women presented on stage at two sold-out shows at The Blue Room Theatre Winter Arts Program in 2019.
- Saga Sisterhood invited to perform at Mapping Melbourne 2019
- A Mile in My Shoes stories toured the UK, Europe, USA and Brazil. Over 25,000 people have walked in the Western Australian shoes and listened to the stories collected by the Centre for Stories. These stories continue to tour globally.
- Four storytellers presented stories at the Denmark Festival of Voice in 2018.
- Two storytellers will perform at Fringe Festival 2020.
- Over 22 story training projects completed.


'In terms of my career development, Bright Lights, No City was pivotal and a catalytic moment. After the launch night, where I stood up and shared my true story to an audience for the first time, I felt creatively unencumbered after years of internalised homophobia. I wrote a novella titled Poster Boy and finished it in a remarkable four days. It won the prestigious nation-wide Novella project and was published in Griffith Review in October 2018. I have gone on to share my Bright Lights, No City story at writers' festivals and recently told my story at an annual fundraiser for Lifeline WA, helping them to raise funds to train more telephone counsellors for people in crisis. This is a testament to the far-reaching social and cultural impacts of the work done by the Centre for Stories in the diversity space.'
